Research Recognition

In 2022 our members saw continued success. Dr Safiullah Taye became a member of the Board of International Advisory Editors at the Middle East Critique Journal. Prof Ihsan Yilmaz gained success in the new ARC Discovery Project titled: Civilisations Mobilisation, Digital Technologies and Social Cohesion, with Dr Priya Chacko and Dr Ana-Maria Bliuc. Dr Arif Saba completed his PhD and has been awarded his doctoral certificate. Prof Benjamin Isakhan was named Australia's Leading Researcher in Middle Eastern and Islamic Studies in the *The Australian* annual research report. The Alfred Deakin Institute for Citizenship and Globalisation was proud to host an international research consortium for Elrha's Global Prioritisation Exercise, led by Dr Marian Abouzeid. 2022 saw four main events hosted that year. May held a webinar webinar on 'The implications of the war in Ukraine for the Middle East' with an esteemed panel consisting of Prof. Sadegh Zibakalam (University of Tehran), A/Prof. Nikolay Kozhanov (the Gulf Studies Center of Qatar University), A/Prof. Anicée Van Engeland (Cranfield University) in conversation with Prof Shahram Akbarzadeh. May was also the celebration of Abbas Farasoo completing his PhD at Deakin University in 2022. He researched the impact of proxy war in Afghanistan. Before joining Deakin University he was Chargé d'Affaires and Deputy Ambassador at Afghanistan Embassy in Australia (2014-2017).

Dr Jessie Moritz (Australian National University), lecturer at the Centre for Arab and Islamic Studies (CAIS) at the ANU, presented a powerful webinar presentation on 'Satire and the State in Saudi Arabia' in June. The event examined how satirists navigate highly repressive authoritarian environments and how they respond to attempts to coop their work by the state.

Lastly in December a conference was held on Deakin's Burwood Campus titled 'The Middle East in Transition' exploring the question, "with the rapid global changes that have occurred since the start of the COVID pandemic, are established understandings of Middle East politics and society still relevant?" Prof Sarah Phillips (University of Sydney) presented the keynote 'After al-Qa'ida, after ISIS? Violence in the Middle East.'
